Attendance:

Regular attendance and being on time are crucial for this class. Creating a community of generous, intelligent and dynamic storytellers is our primary goal. This is not only excellent *artistic* training, but also important *life* training. These large ideas must be fueled by discipline and trust. Do not be late, or absent—the community (Village) depends on your presence. This is true for in class work as well as rehearsals, research and school visits conducted outside of class.

Course Objectives:

- 1. You will develop your acting, voice and movement skills learned in previous classes and productions by immediate application to the creative process of original storytelling (Devised Theatre).
- 2. You will learn the demands of extending and adapting your acting to suit different styles of performance including those learned from other global storytelling communities.
- 3. You will develop the analytical, intellectual and story development skills necessary to create original performance and storytelling: *Collaboration, Research, Rehearsal, Performance*.
- 4. You will develop vocabulary sufficient to articulate clear connections from our work to the areas of conflict resolution, community building and identity exploration.
- 5. You will identify and develop the necessary skills to tour, perform and facilitate original storytelling in a variety of educational and community settings. This *Service Learning* component will be reinforced throughout the semester.

Course Format:

Your work this semester will involve utilizing a variety of improvisation, community building, research and teaching techniques to achieve your acting, performance and service goals. We will regularly be referring back to your discoveries and observations through your traditional and non-traditional research assignments.

You will be asked to **immediately** apply the work of acting to your ideas in class, your development of new work, performing and teaching off campus. Moving from the *intellectual idea* to the *physical expression of that idea* is central to your development as artists in this course. This step will highlight the theory that theater artists can be viewed as **community activists**.

You are expected to be completely warmed-up and **present** as class begins so that we can get directly to the work. This is one of many commitments you will make to each other and the collaborative process covered in the **Village Rules** (attached).

The focus of our work this semester will be to perform the original play *Hello My Name Is* ____ created last semester by students like you. We will work in partnership with local high schools and on-campus departments, offices and programs as we tour this play and facilitate its accompanying workshop. This class will create the workshop before our tour begins. Facilitating this workshop will activate the lessons from the play for our audiences, further defining the role of story as a tool for *conflict resolution, community building and identity exploration*.

Service Learning

This course is an officially designated *Service learning* course at Buffalo State, and carries with it particular emphasis on your transcript, and particular responsibilities throughout this semester. SUNY defines service learning as:

"A teaching and learning approach that integrates community service with academic study to enrich learning, teach civic responsibility, and strengthen communities." We will accomplish this by:

- 1) Service to others: Performing play, facilitating workshop.
- 2) Ties to academic content: Actively approaching and applying performance training as community activists vs. entertainers, performers or actors
- 3) Student reflection on the service-learning experience: Create *My Story* solo performance final project, expressing how your personal story has changed as a result of our work this semester.

Requirements and Materials:

You will be expected to create the following:

- 1. Research/Process Journals (text, collages, pictures, video, etc.)
- 2. Personal Process for Performances/workshops
- 3. Collaborative Process for Performances/workshops
- 4. My Story Refection


